President's Report

We have had a succession of excellent speakers, the most recent, Lee Baines from Marine Rescue. I have personally thanked our member, Roger Wakefield for the excellent job he continues to do in attracting the best of the best. The good times continue with Wayne Cooper our guest speaker addressing us on his walking the Kokoda Track.

I am writing this report, having today, attended a lunch at Jewells Tavern with Warner's Bay Probus Club. It was good to meet the 8 members from Warner's Bay, who joined in with our members, and judging from the level of conversation, new friendships were formed. John Benson has again organised a good event.

Guest Speaker Section

Lee Baines our guest speaker delivered an engaging presentation on Marine Rescue NSW.

I'll endeavour to impart some of the information to the best of my knowledge and apology for any inaccuracies.

Guest Speaker Section continued

There are approximately 3,000 volunteers who man 47 Marine Rescue units across NSW. There are 150 volunteers based at the new Swansea Heads building. Government Grants were obtained for the construction but \$350K had to be raised for the fit out and landscaping. If I heard Lee correctly another \$120K had to be raised for the digital systems. An invitation to visit their new site was extended.

Their charter covers all water sport rescues, information on tides, markers in the channel as well as bars and assisting vessels into the lake. To achieve rescues there are two vessels, two jet skies and a runabout. The Marine Rescue operates 24/7 and on roster system. The area covers 30 nautical miles off shore. In certain circumstance this is exceeded subject to conditions and the skippers OK.

The volunteers have to be fully qualified and have National Accreditation in the roll undertaken. In relation to radio, skippering and other facets of the charter there are hours of study and on the job training.

To achieve the smooth operation at the base there are administration, operational, unit support and fundraising personnel. Lake Macquarie unit is the busiest in NSW. In 2022 Lake Macquarie rescues represented 15% of the States total.

A location 'App' was developed by one of the volunteers that can pin point a vessel in distress and is being rolled out nation wide. This allows far quicker responses to the actual rescue site. If you are on the lake or the ocean be prepared and ensue you have the right equipment as it could be life saving.

When you are out on the water log onto Marine Rescue. There are indicators on their digital systems where there are signals when you do not return as specified. If this happens there are certain actions and criteria to be followed. After an hour the police are contacted.

Following some short videos of rescues Lee answered questions. From the questions asked and applause given the presentation was well received.

Marine Rescue is reliant on donations to allow the smooth and continual running of the organisation.

Lee is the principal author of the book titled 'Lake Macquarie and its Coastline'. This book has multiple sponsors and ALL proceeds from sale are donated to Marine Rescue. YESTER YEAR

The 1960 Armstrong 500 was an endurance motor race for Australian made or assembled standard production sedans. The event was held at the Phillip Island Grand Prix Circuit in Victoria on 20 November 1960 over a distance of 167 laps x 3.0 miles totalling 501 miles in total.
